

# IMPACT OF ANTHROPOGENIC NOISE ON JUVENILE LEMON SHARKS

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
## RESEARCH QUESTIONS

- 1. Do sharks use sound to find habitat and prey?
- 2. Does anthropogenic noise modify behaviour?
- 3. Can we mitigate potential impacts?

#### BACKGROUND

- Human presence on coastlines is increasing<sup>1</sup>
- Noise from human activities pollutes marine soundscapes
- Juvenile sharks depend on coastal environments for shelter and prey<sup>2</sup>
- Sharks are **sensitive** to low-frequency noise<sup>3</sup>
- Noises from human sources may be detected by sharks, affecting behaviour

# MODEL SYSTEM

- Bimini, The Bahamas, supports
  300 juvenile lemon sharks<sup>4</sup>
- Range spans pristine mangrove and areas of high human disturbance



### **IMPLICATIONS**

- Increasing our understanding of shark sensory ecology
- Conservation of sharks and their habitat
- Creating a framework for further study
- Development of policy to mitigate impact of coastal development
